

### **Surgery Day**

### **Before You Leave Home**

- ☐ Wash again with the antibacterial soap again that you received at your pre-surgery visit.
- ☐ Take your daily medicines as you were told, with sips of clear liquid.
- ☐ If you do not have diabetes: Drink 1 carton of Ensure Clear 2 hours before you arrive for surgery.



☐ Do **not** eat or drink anything.

### At the Hospital

- ☐ Check in at Surgery Registration on the ground floor of the Maleng Building (level G).
- ☐ Give staff at Registration a copy of your advance directive(s) if you have them.
- ☐ A nurse will call you to come to the pre-op area.
- ☐ If you have diabetes, your blood sugar will be checked.
- ☐ An *intravenous* (IV) tube will be placed in your arm to give you fluids, antibiotics, and pain medicine.
- ☐ Your nose will be swabbed with antiseptic to help reduce your risk of infection after surgery.
- ☐ You will be given a heating blanket to keep you warm, improve healing, and lower the risk of infection. Keep the blanket on even if you feel warm enough.
- ☐ The Anesthesiology Team will take you to the operating room for your surgery.





### After surgery, you will:

☐ Be moved to a bed in a hospital unit.

### You will have:

- ☐ An IV in your arm to give you fluids, antibiotics, and pain medicine.
- ☐ Wraps on your legs that inflate to help prevent blood clots.
- ☐ A tube in your bladder to remove urine.

### Your nurse will help you:

- ☐ Learn breathing exercises to prevent lung infection (pneumonia).
- ☐ Use your *incentive spirometer* and remind you to use it 10 times each hour every day while you are in the hospital.
- ☐ Travel from the unit to get a *computed tomography* (CT) scan, then return to the unit.
- ☐ Start a clear liquid diet.

### **Diet and Activity**

☐ To help with your recovery, your nurse or physical therapist (PT) will help you stand up.

□ When you can swallow safely, you will start on a general diet. You will be able to order your own meals when your care team says it is OK.



### **Planning for Discharge**

☐ Talk with a member of your care team about your discharge plan.

☐ If you have concerns about where you will go when you leave the hospital, tell your care team. They will set up a time for you to talk with a social worker.



### **Day 3 Until Discharge**

### **Medicines, Treatments, and Therapy**

☐ You will wear leg wraps while in bed to help prevent blood clots.

☐ Your team will care for your dressing(s), incision, and drain(s).

☐ If you had cervical spine surgery, you may see a speech therapist to assess your swallowing.

### **Activity**

□ Keep getting out of bed and increasing your daily activity as you can.

☐ If you are having problems with self-care tasks, you may see an Occupational Therapist for assessment.

### **Planning for Discharge**

☐ You will be ready for discharge when:

- You are urinating and passing gas

- Your pain is well controlled during basic activity

Your drain is removed

Your wound is dry and has no sign of infection

- You do not need your IV anymore

 If you will go home at discharge, make sure that your ride home will be ready by noon on your discharge day and that you will have help at home. If your driver cannot come by noon, they may meet you in the discharge lounge.
