# After Your Hysteroscopy

What you should know

This handout gives self-care instructions and tells you what symptoms to call your doctor or nurse about after your hysteroscopy.

## **Activity and Self-care**

- The Ativan (lorazepam) that you took before your procedure can take up to 6 hours to wear off completely. Until it has worn off, do **not**:
  - Drive or travel alone
  - Use machinery
  - Drink alcohol
  - Sign any legal papers
  - Be responsible for the care of another person
- You can eat and drink as usual.
- You will be given pain medicine to lessen pain and cramping after the procedure. Only take this medicine if you are feeling pain:
  - **Ibuprofen**, 800 mg pill. You can take this every 8 hours. If you are having pain even after taking this medicine, please call the Women's Health Care Center at 206-598-5500 and ask to speak with a nurse.
- You may have a small amount of bleeding (like a period) for up to 5 days. This should taper off quickly.
- Do **not** place anything in your vagina for 2 weeks. This means no intercourse, tampons, douching, etc. Use pads if you are bleeding.

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### When to Call the Doctor or Nurse

Call the Women's Health Care Center (see phone numbers at left) or your doctor **right away** if you have:

- Heavy bleeding: you are soaking 1 maxi pad an hour for 3 or more hours.
- A fever higher than 100.5°F (38°C).
- Severe abdominal pain, even after using pain medicine.
