# Diphenhydramine HCl (Benadryl)

Information and dosage chart

# What is diphenhydramine HCI?

Diphenhydramine HCl is an *antihistamine*, a type of medicine that prevents allergy symptoms. These symptoms include sneezing, runny nose, itching, watery eyes, and rashes or hives (skin welts or raised, red itchy bumps). Diphenhydramine HCl can also be used with other drugs to treat *anaphylactic shock* (also called *anaphylaxis*), a severe, life-threatening allergic reaction. Taking diphenhydramine HCl usually makes you feel sleepy. But it can also make you feel "on edge" or excited.

# What is the right dose?

Give the dose recommended for your child's weight for most allergy symptoms. See the dosage chart below. If your child is under 12 months of age, give 1 mg per 1 kilogram (0.5 mg per pound) of body weight. Doses may be repeated every 6 to 8 hours, if needed. Do **not** give diphenhydramine HCl to children under 12 months of age who have chickenpox, unless your child's doctor tells you to.

- For **hives**: The dose may need to be repeated every 6 hours for 24 hours or more.
- For **anaphylaxis**: If the child can swallow, give **2 times the dose below**.

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#### Cautions

- Read the label. Be sure that the product you are giving your child is diphenhydramine HCl. There are many products with similar names or with other ingredients added.
- Since diphenhydramine HCl thickens secretions (mucus and phlegm), use it with caution if your child has asthma or wheezing.
- Be sure to read the labels of all medicines given to your child to ensure that your child is getting only 1 medicine at a time that contains diphenhydramine HCl. For example, do not use Benadryl cream along with Wal-Dryl liquid.

# When to Call the Doctor

Call your doctor if your child has:

- Other underlying health problems, such as seizures, thyroid problems, or a urinary tract infection
- Had adverse reactions to this or any antihistamine in the past

# Side Effects and Adverse Reactions

Use the lowest effective dose of diphenhydramine HCl to lessen side effects and adverse reactions. These may include:

- Drowsiness
- Sedation
- Dry mouth
- Excitability
- Restlessness
- Dizziness
