If You Are Receiving Allergy Injections

Important warning about beta-blocker medicines

The medicines listed in this handout may cause serious health problems if you use them while you are receiving allergy injections.

These medicines are called beta-blockers. They are used to treat a variety of health conditions, including high blood pressure, irregular heartbeat, migraine headaches, and an eye condition called glaucoma.



Call the Allergy Clinic right away if you receive allergy injections and use any of the medicines listed in this handout.

What should I do?

- Tell **all** your doctors that you are receiving allergy injections.
- Call the Allergy Clinic **right away** if you use any of these medicines or eye drops:

- propranolol (Hemangeol, Inderal, Inderal LA, Inderal XL, Inderide, InnoPran XL, Intensol)
- sotalol (Betapace, Betapace AF, Sorine)
- timolol (Blocadren)

Eye Drops

- betaxolol (Betoptic, Betoptic S)
- carteolol (Cartrol, Ocupress)
- levobunolol (Betagan)
- metipranolol (OptiPranolol)
- timolol (Betimol, Combigan, Cosopt, Cosopt Ocumeter, Cosopt Ocumeter Plus, Cosopt PF, Istalol, Timoptic, Timoptic GFS, Timoptic Ocuduse, Timoptic Ocumeter, Timoptic Ocumeter Plus, Timoptic-XE, Timoptic-XE Ocumeter, Timoptic-XE Ocumeter Plus)
